




HISTORY OF BBPA

Denham Jolly had a vision that there should be a community group that serves the purpose of the Black community. He called a meeting and invited leaders from the community to discuss how they could collectively support Black businesses.

On October 21, 1982, several members of the Black Community gathered for a meeting at the Underground Railroad restaurant in downtown Toronto. Among the attendees were attorney Romain Pitt, who made the opening remarks; Al Hamilton, publisher of Contrast Newspaper; and Bromley Armstrong, a community activist who helped lobby the Ontario government to pass anti-discrimination laws.

At that meeting, the attendees made the decision to form an association for the purpose of advocating on behalf of Black businesses and to showcase the much-maligned Black community. The name was instated as the "Black Business and Professional Association" (BBPA) as a statement of the organization's commitment to equity.

Following the October 1982 meeting, the association chose to honour the six Black Canadian athletes who excelled at that year's Commonwealth Games: Angela Taylor-Issanjenko, Ben Johnson, Mark McKoy, Milt Ottey, Tony Sharpe and Desai Williams. A dinner was suggested at which Harry Jerome, Canada's premiere track and field athlete of the 1960s would be invited to be the keynote speech. But before the plans could be finalized, Harry Jerome died suddenly in December 1982.



HISTORY OF BBPA

The event became a tribute to Harry Jerome and an awards ceremony to honour the six athletes. Thus, the first Harry Jerome Awards was held on March 5, 1983. Four decades later, the Harry Jerome Awards has grown into a national event that recognizes and honours excellence in Black Canadian achievement. In July 1983, the Black Business and Professional Association was incorporated as a non-profit charitable organization, with a mandate to address equity and opportunity for the Black community in business, employment, education and economic development

The first directors of the BBPA were Pamela Appelt, Bromley Armstrong, Jean Augustine, Jean Gammage (Kamala-Jean Gopie), Al Hamilton, Denham Jolly and Cynthia Reyes. Denham Jolly, whose vision gave birth to the BBPA, was elected our first president.

In addition to the Harry Jerome Awards, the BBPA sponsors the BBPA National Scholarship Fund, providing financial support to Black Canadian youth who pursue higher education. The Harry Jerome Scholarship Program (now the BBPA National Scholarships) was originally proposed by Hamlin Grange and realized through the efforts of Kamala-Jean Gopie, Pamela Appelt, Sheila Simpson, Beverly Mascoll and BBPA president Cynthia Reyes. Under the leadership of Verlyn Francis, the scholarship fund established an endowment fund and established corporate sponsorship in 1996. Today, the fund awards upwards of 30 scholarships each year.



Nadine Spencer is the Interim CEO of the Black Business and Professional Association (BBPA), leading the organization's efforts to advance Canada's Black community through equity and programming initiatives. She is also the Founder of BrandEQ, a global agency specializing in social change marketing, communications, and public relations. Nadine pioneered BrandEQ Black, which examines racial biases in advertising and marketing. She is a dedicated Black community champion who has devoted her life to fighting discrimination, battling poverty, advancing women's education, and advocating for equality for women and girls of color. Nadine has received numerous accolades, including the Harry Jerome Business Award, the United Nations Volunteer Award, and was named CGA Businesswoman of the Year in 2020.

Ross is an accomplished recruitment executive and the Chair of the board at BBPA. His early experience included working in family-owned businesses in St Lucia. Ross has since founded ITS Global in 2017, a talent solutions company, and has worked in small to large global and multi-national organizations. He has been recognized as a strategic change agent, accelerating growth in organizations. Ross is also an active community member and has served on several organizations. He is an ambitious and charismatic leader, bringing energy, knowledge, and commitment to every initiative he is involved in. Ross lives by Barack Obama's quote "A change is brought about because ordinary people do extraordinary things." He currently resides in Ajax ON with his wife and three children.



ABOUT HARRY JEROME

Henry "Harry" Winston Jerome, OC (September 30, 1940 - December 7, 1982) was a Canadian track and field runner and Olympic athlete. He was the grandson of John Howard, a railway porter who represented Canada in the 1912 Summer Olympics.

Born in Prince Albert, Saskatchewan, Harry Jerome moved to North Vancouver at age 12. In 1970, he was made an Officer of the Order of Canada. He died of a brain aneurysm in December 1982, at the age of 42. His sister, Valerie Jerome, was also an Olympian who competed for Canada at the 1960 Summer Olympics in Rome.

Jerome competed at the university level for Bill Bowerman at the University of Oregon. He also competed for Canada in the 1960, 1964 and 1968 Summer Olympics, winning the 100-metre bronze in 1964. He also won gold in the 1966 British Empire and Commonwealth Games and the completing the 100 metres in 10.2, 10.1 and finally 10.0 seconds in 1960, tying a record established a month earlier by Germany's Armin Hary. He later set the world record for the 100-yard dash at 9.2 seconds, making Jerome one of only a few athletes to own both the 100-yard and 100-metre world record simultaneously. He was a member of the University of Oregon's 4 x 100 m relay team that tied the world record of 40.0 seconds in 1962. In 1966, he again tied a world record with a 9.1-second time in the 100-yard dash. From 1963 to 1966, he held or equaled four world records concurrently. He continued to sprint successfully until late 1960s, despite suffering an injury so severe at the Perth Commonwealth Games in 1962 that doctors believed he would never walk again.

Jerome earned a master's degree in physical education from the University of Oregon. After retiring from the athletics in 1969, he was invited by the Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau to help create Canada's new Ministry of Sport. He held a number of senior positions in the ministry but resigned over the government's cancellation of a large-scale public-private partnership he had negotiated with Kellogg's to promote youth participation in athletics.

During the 1980s, Jerome headed the Premier's Sport Award program in British Columbia, Canada.

The Stanley Park seawall in his native Vancouver is graced with a 9-foot bronze statue of Jerome. The annual Harry Jerome Awards, the national awards dinner for Canada's Black community organized by the Black Business and Professional Association (BBPA), is named after him. He was named an Officer of the Order of Canada in 1970 and inducted into the Canada's Sports Hall of Fame in 1971. In 2001, he was inducted into Canada's Walk of Fame and in 2010 he was named a Person of National Historical Significance.




Young Entrepreneur Award

Agunbiade Seun Richards

Arts Award Ngozi Paul

Ngozi Paul is an award-winning stage and screen actress, writer, director, and producer. Born and raised in Toronto to Pan-African parents from the Caribbean islands, her upbringing created the foundation for her work as a social and cultural innovator. With academic roots in the prestigious Birmingham Conservatory for Classical Theatre, Ngozi began her acting career on stage at the Stratford Festival of Canada.

Following the groundbreaking and successful run of the theatre production 'da Kink in My Hair, Ngozi co-created, executive produced, and starred in the television series of the same name. Most recently, she wrote and starred in the play The Emancipation of Ms. Lovely, which was nominated for six Dora Awards and won Outstanding New Play, and appeared in the Netflix miniseries Self Made: Inspired by the Life of Madam C.J. Walker.





Lifetime Achievement Award

Spider "Chuck" Jones

An award winning journalist in both the music and boxing fields, Jones is a three time former amateur Golden Glove Champion and was inducted into the Canadian Boxing Hall of fame in 1996. Spider was recently voted "Boxing Commentator and M.C. of the Year" by the Board of Governors for the World Boxing Federation.

Spider is also a highly popular motivational speaker who is much admired for his diligent work among the youth. His inspirational life story "Out of the Darkness" reveals his amazing rise from the impoverished, gang infested, inner-city projects of Detroit and Windsor and how, as a grade five dropout, he eventually returned to school at the age of thirty to become an honour student. Spider's favourite thing is talking to his Nighthawks, whether it be about sports, entertainment, or hot issues.

President's Award Rick Gossling

Rick Gosling, a social worker and theologian, founded The Children's Breakfast Club in 1984 with the objective of providing healthy breakfasts to children from working mother-led families in Toronto's Jane and Falstaff area. The program has grown rapidly to serve up to 60 children per day, five days per week, and is still volunteer and privately funded, with \$0.87 of every dollar going directly to feeding children. The organization has also expanded its operations to rural communities beyond the Greater Toronto Area, providing food, winter coats, gently used toys, and sports equipment to underprivileged children.



Leadership Award Rosemarie Powell

Rosemarie Powell is a passionate advocate for social, economic and environmental justice. She has led for over 20 years from the grassroots up, managing and developing several innovative and impactful community programs and services to support under-represented group's access to the labour market. Her community engagement work in Jane Finch earned several awards for leadership and imagination. Rosemarie is currently the Executive Director of the Toronto Community Benefits Network (TCBN).

The Toronto Community Benefits Network, is a community/labour coalition of over 120 member organizations which initiated successful Community Benefits Agreements for the Eglinton Crosstown and Finch West LRT transit projects, West Park Healthcare Centre and Woodbine Casino expansion.



Professional Excellence Award Emma Todd

Emma is the CEO of MMH Technology Group, a company that specializes in Data Systems, Blockchain Consulting, Communication, and Events for emerging technology organizations. She is an esteemed member of the Canadian Blockchain Consortium and serves as Chair of the Mining Committee and a board member. Emma is also the Chair for Girls In Tech, advocating for women's representation in the industry. Notably, Emma has achieved a significant milestone by joining the board of Tokens.com, making her one of the 7% of women of color on a publicly traded board.

She has received various accolades, including being named Crypto Royalty by Toronto Life magazine, one of the Top 100 Black Women to watch in Canada, and one of the Top 100 Influencers for Sustainable Development Goals in 2019. Emma hosts the largest free "in person" blockchain conference in Canada and serves as a judge for the prestigious Canadian Marketing Awards.





Technology Award Colleen Ward

Colleen is the Vice President of Delivery Practice and EPDE, Platforms & Technology, overseeing the Canadian Debit Card, Canadian Credit Card (TD Credit Cards, Aeroplan, MBNA and CUETS), Merchant Solutions, and Customer Assistance technology teams. She started her career with HSBC while studying at university, gaining expertise in lending and credit card processing through operations and sales support roles.

Colleen later became AVP of National Sales, leading The Brick, Canada's top private label credit card account. She then moved on to American Express, holding several global technology leadership roles for nearly 11 years.

Colleen earned a BA in Economics and Math from the University of Toronto and is an active member of TD's Women in Technology, Black Executive Steering Committee, Black Employee Network, and Visible Minority network.
